Expanded cardiology services

On page 8, you can read about our current efforts to expand cardiology services on the Palouse, building on decades of commitment from Dennis Simpson, MD. In addition to Dr. Simpson's noninvasive cardiology care, David Jones, MD, began his practice at Palouse Heart Center in September 2017.

Adding to this expanded availability and in recognition of Dr. Simpson's continuing service, the PRH Foundation has established the Dennis L. Simpson Distinguished Directorship for Cardiology through the Ed and Beatriz Schweitzer Founding Benefactor Fund for Cardiology. This endowed directorship not only honors Dr. Simpson and his ongoing service to his patients, but it also provides financial and professional support for the continued growth and development of cardiology services on the Palouse.





Letter of thanks

I am writing this email in praise of and in gratitude to your emergency room staff.

On Jan. 1, 2018, it was necessary for me to bring my wife to Pullman Regional Hospital's Emergency Department. We had traveled to Washington state from Delaware to visit family for the holidays. You can imagine how nervous I was to be in a city where I did not know any doctors but needed to obtain medical care for my wife. To compound this, my wife suffers from a rare disease which requires a protocol to be followed prior to any procedure being performed.

We were greeted by a cheerful receptionist who took all of our information and set us up to be taken into a room for treatment. We waited for a very brief time in the waiting area before a very cheerful CNA came out to the reception area to escort us into an examination room. Another member of your staff came into the room and meticulously took down the details of my wife's complaint and medical history. When she saw the vast list of medications my wife takes for her condition, she asked if she could use my list to go outside and enter this information into my wife's records. Shortly thereafter a nurse entered the room, introduced herself, and assured us that a doctor would be in soon.

Within minutes we met Aaron Scott, MD. He listened to my wife's concerns and examined her. Just as important, Dr. Scott listened to me as I explained about my wife's illness. He took the time to make a copy of her medical history, which I brought with us. I know that Dr. Scott took the time to read the history and follow the protocol and precautions which my wife's specialist wrote up in the medical history prior to initiating his treatment procedure. Although I was not in the treatment room during the procedure, my wife told me that Dr. Scott was wonderful and caring as he treated her.

When we are in the public eye, we often do not hear praise when it is deserved; most often we hear complaints and criticism. So I thought it was important to voice my gratitude and give kudos to all the ED staff members with whom we interacted on that day. Please relay my thoughts to your staff when time allows. Thank you.



Speech Sounds Visualized app now available

Created by Keri Jones, Speech Language Pathologist, through the Center for Learning & Innovation at Pullman Regional Hospital, Speech Sounds Visualized is a first-of-its-kind web-based tool that shows the user how the mouth, tongue and throat make sounds for clear pronunciation.

Designed for both adults and children, the customizable app helps English language learners pronounce standard American English sounds more clearly and is also beneficial for accent reduction.

Speech Sounds Visualized is the only app using a combination of x-ray images, audio recordings, and written instructions to guide the user in forming the standard American English sounds. The innovative x-ray technology to capture the movements of articulation was overseen by a radiation health physicist.

Speech Sounds Visualized is a new digital app designed for English pronunciation training and is available on Apple's App Store for \$9.99.

Fellowships awarded for Innovation in Healthcare 2017

The Community Health Impact Fellowship Program was created by the Pullman Regional Hospital Center for Learning & Innovation in 2016 to encourage community collaboration, collegiality and productivity to dramatically improve healthcare delivery and improve patient outcomes.

The fellowship is available to faculty at Washington State University who work with hospital departments to test their research through realtime experiences in a clinical setting while using hospital data.

The 2017 awards were presented to Bidisha Mandal, PhD, with the WSU School of Economic Sciences; Hassan Ghasemzadeh, PhD, with the WSU School of Electrical Engineering and Computer Science; and Lei Li, PhD, with the School of Mechanical and Materials Engineering.

The review of the 2018 applicants is in process and we look forward to working with additional faculty to improve healthcare and research in our community.

Rural Medical Residency Program

Preparing for the future

Pullman Regional Hospital

has taken an important step toward establishing a rural medical residency program here on the Palouse—the first of its kind. We are working with the Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical Education (ACGME) to establish an accredited rural residency training track for graduate medical education in Family Medicine with the Spokane Teaching Health Center program. The goal is to train and retain these residents to continue to practice medicine on the Palouse.

In January, a representative from the ACGME visited the Pullman and Spokane sites as part of the accreditation process. Robert Maudlin, PharmD, the Spokane Teaching Health Center designated institutional officer, organized and facilitated the site visits, which included a review of physical space, proposed curriculum, documentation and involved faculty.

Journey to accreditation

A residency is additional training that follows graduation from medical school. PRH's rural residency track in family medicine would be three years long, with the first year in Spokane and the second and third years in Pullman.

A decision to accredit the program is expected in April. If approved, medical students applying to qualified residency programs will be matched to Providence Holy Family Residency program with the Pullman Regional Hospital Rural Pathway in the fall of 2018.

Two applicants will be chosen and will begin their first year of residency in family medicine at Providence Holy Family Hospital in Spokane, followed by two years in Pullman.

In 2021, two more residents will be training in Pullman, bringing the total residents to four.

physician with Palouse Medical in Pullman, is the site director for the Pullman Rural Pathway, along with multiple members of PRH's medical staff, who will serve as faculty and be involved in training.

"We are already actively involved in teaching the next generation of healthcare providers through the area nursing school agreements, student volunteers, job shadows and medical students" says Gerald Early, MD, Chief Medical and Innovation Officer at PRH. "Through the Pullman Rural Pathway, we will have an accredited medical residency track with two medical residents training in Pullman, beginning in 2020."

Entering The Next Era of Excellence

Scott Adams, Chief Executive Officer, says this is part of the hospital's **Next Era of Excellence** in healthcare. "We know that it's critical that PRH and the Palouse continue to have a strong medical staff of primary care physicians and specialists in the future," he says.

"We also know that residents are more likely to go on to practice as a physician where they performed their residency, so we are taking a proactive approach to build a residency program in family medicine to help build the future we want for healthcare on the Palouse," Adams says.

At Pullman Regional Hospital, we're expanding our cardiology program and building on the legacy of Dennis Simpson, MD, who has provided heart care on the Palouse for more than 35 years.

Joining Dr. Simpson in PRH's cardiology program is David Jones, MD, FACC, to continue and enhance the level of care for our cardiac patients right here at home.

In addition, two cardiologists from Spokane Cardiology are also providing services through our Specialty Clinic every other week.

A full spectrum of care

PRH cardiology services include:

- Consultation for cardiac patients with heart failure, valvular heart disease, coronary artery disease, arrhythmias and symptoms of possible heart disease
- Education for preventing heart disease

• Interpretation of echocardiography and stress tests for early diagnosis and intervention

• Transesophageal echocardiogram, an ultrasound diagnostic tool for clearer pictures of the heart

• Pacemaker implantation and monitoring

2018 Highest Needs Fund Drive

To continue improving and expanding our cardiology services, high-priority upgrades are needed. These include: • An upgrade for hospital patient monitoring system with a more

advanced alarm system

• New digital system for storing and sharing patient cardiac data all in one place, with off-site reading capabilities for physicians

• Cardiac treadmills, used for diagnostic testing

• Cardiac-specific ultrasound machines and transesophageal echocardiography probe for superior images of the heart

• Ambulatory rhythm monitoring for at-home heart rhythm monitoring

• EKG machines, used for diagnostic testing of electrical impulses

Comprehensive heart care has been a longtime need of our region. Providing these services decreases patient travel for out-of-town treatment, provides earlier diagnosis, and starts patients on their journey to healing within the comfort of their own community and homes.



A heart for philanthropy

Ed and Beatriz Schweitzer Founding Benefactor Fund for Cardiology

Gala raises \$625,000 for cardiology services At the 12th annual Pullman Regional Hospital Foundation Gala, Ed and Beatriz Schweitzer took to the stage for a surprise announcement to honor local physician Dennis Simpson, MD. The community leaders shared their passion for supporting cardiology services on the Palouse with the creation of the Ed and Beatriz Schweitzer Founding Benefactor Fund for Cardiology. The \$250,000 gift will support the collaborative efforts of the hospital and local physicians to provide heart care on the Palouse.

Pullman Regional Hospital Foundation's "Elegant Affair," the 12th annual Gala (presented by Avista), drew 320 hospital supporters to the SEL Event Center on Feb. 3, 2018.

The announcement of the hospital's 2018 priorities by hospital CEO Scott Adams revealed the hospital's commitment to supporting cardiology services on the Palouse, officially kicking off the fundraising drive.

A preliminary goal of \$1 million will help fund cardiology equipment. With the Gala program half over, Adams announced a profoundly generous gift of \$250,000 by Ed and Beatriz Schweitzer on top of their \$250,000 gift to the Ed and Beatriz Schweitzer Founding Benefactor Fund for Cardiology. The Schweitzer's leadership gift, and the generosity of the community through event registrations, sponsorships, and auction and raffle proceeds, brought in more than \$625,000 to support cardiology services on the Palouse.



From the CDO Awe, humility and gratitude



It seems every year is full of surprises—and 2017 was no different. From the Gala to

the Golf tournament, to new programs and

services, it was a year of good surprises and hard work to meet the hospital's needs.

Planning, focus and discipline by the Pullman Regional Hospital Foundation Board and staff put us in a position to help the hospital achieve its financial goals.

Funding renovations and expanded services

The hospital was in need of more space for same-day services, and the community stepped up and contributed more than \$750,000 for the construction of a new 10,000-square-foot, \$3 million facility.

We were awed and surprised when Ed and Beatriz Schweitzer announced a \$500,000 gift at the 2017 Gala to kick off the Same-Day Services Building fundraising program. Construction will begin in the spring of 2018.

Providing athletic training services to local high schools

There was a need to provide more and consistent athletic training services to area high school student athletes. Ed Tingstad, MD, and Steve Pennington, MD, from Pullman Regional Hospital Orthopaedic Center of Excellence (in partnership with Pullman Regional Hospital), the Foundation and Pullman, Colton, Potlatch and Garfield-Palouse high schools made a commitment to hire one part-time and four full-time and certified athletic trainers as part of a three-year pilot program.

With full-time trainers at each high school district last fall, more than 750 student athletes have seen better access to athletic training care and orthopaedic services.

The Foundation Board committed to raising \$405,000 over the next three years to support the program with Dave Christy State Farm, Avista Foundation and Shelley Bennett Palouse Commercial Real Estate joining on as the first corporate supporters.

Our first public fundraising event was a celebrity athlete autograph session, sponsored by Zeppoz, and community members continue to show support through the Regional High School Athletic Training Program fundraising guild.

Growing the Women's Leadership Guild

There was a need to build on the great leadership of Ashley Alred, past chair of the Women's Leadership Guild. Angie Feuerstein accepted the challenge and has been running full-speed since. With the help of the board and current members, she grew membership by 41 percent to 34 members in 2017 and provided seven grants to women and children agencies. Women leaders in this community are meeting a need to support the health and wellness of women and children in our region.

Humility and gratitude

I am humbled and grateful every day to be in this role, working with excellent staff, generous donors, and strong hospital and Foundation Board leaders. Everyone is supporting the healthcare needs in our community.

I am sure there will be more surprises and challenges in 2018, but we will focus and continue to build trust with community members to make this the best healthcare environment for all.

2017: An eventful year

Our community generously supports our essential goals and needs





A successful 2017 Annual Giving program in support of our highest needs ensured Pullman Regional Hospital can build on the five-star patient experience and serve more patients needing same-day services by expanding the hospital's footprint to include a building expansion.

• 11th annual PRH Foundation Gala

More than 325 hospital supporters gathered at the 11th annual PRH Foundation Gala (presented by Avista) to celebrate accomplishing the 2016 fundraising goal for the hospital's highest needs—the addition of a fourth operating room and updating surgical technology and equipment.

The 2017 highest needs goal—the hospital's building expansion for Same-Day Services was shared, followed by a surprise announcement of a \$500,000 gift from Ed and Beatriz Schweitzer. Their generosity, together with \$157,000 in event proceeds, raised more than \$657,000 in revenue for the hospital's highest needs.

• iHeart Pullman Benefit Concert

Washington State University (WSU) students held a benefit concert, headlined by Allen Stone, on the WSU campus. With support from the Associated Students of WSU, students Emyly Hall and Amanda Jordan led planning efforts for the iHeart Pullman Benefit Concert (presented by College Hill Custom Threads), and raised more than \$25,000 for the hospital's highest needs.

• 12th Annual PRH Foundation Golf Classic

A sold-out 12th Annual PRH Foundation Golf Classic (presented by Columbia Bank) hosted 126 golfers at the region's "most fun" golf tournament.

Golfers and sponsors teed up the highest grossing tournament to date—totaling \$88,000 in support of the Same-Day Services Building Expansion Project.

• Fifth Annual Auto Dealers for Health

The four Pullman auto dealers (Chipman & Taylor Chevrolet; Jess Ford of Pullman; Toyota of Pullman; and Wysup Chrysler, Jeep, Dodge, Ram & Imports) teamed together for a fifth year to support hospital patients by donating funds—\$100 of each new and used vehicle sold during the month of August—totaling \$28,200.

Inaugural Trap Shoot

The first annual Trap Shoot, "Shoot for a Cause," hosted by the Colton Boosters Gun Club, drew participants from as far as Spokane, Washington. The fundraising event was inspired by Chris Jensen, PRH IT Department Director, and raised funds for the hospital's highest needs.

🗕 Women's Leadership Guild

In its third year, the Women's Leadership Guild continued to recruit members who want to make a meaningful difference through the power of philanthropy. Chair Angie Feuerstein nearly doubled membership in 2017. Fifteen regional nonprofits submitted applications for the 2017–2018 grant cycle, and members voted to award funds to seven agencies at \$2,000 apiece in addition to supporting the hospital's highest needs.

Recruiting, retaining and training exceptional physicians

The Endowment for Quality & Access

At Pullman Regional Hospital, we recognize it is the actions, passion, compassion and talents of many which provide the five-star patient experience. At the heart of healing are physicians—an essential component responsible for a thriving community.

We have a bold vision that by 2020, we will have taken action to ensure that access to physicians, along with the highest standards of care, will never be in jeopardy.

Endowment milestones

Now in its fifth year of development, the Endowment for Quality & Access is our solution to fund recruiting, retention, and training efforts to ensure exceptional physicians are here for our community.

A new investment advising relationship with Merrill Lynch and the Steve Harmon group has shown increased returns in comparison to market benchmarks. To date, we have raised approximately \$4.1 million toward a \$10 million goal.

Earnings from this fund are transferred to PRH on a yearly basis and have funded:

• The Physician Leadership Council in their regular council meetings, their continuing leadership education, and their role as advisors to PRH in ensuring our ability to meet the medical needs of our community.

• Support of the efforts to recruit an additional orthopaedic surgeon and a cardiologist to serve our community.

• The Regional High School Athletic Training Program, which provides full-service athletic training coverage for local high schools.

Volunteers make a difference

Volunteers play a key role in the success of the Endowment for Quality & Access. Funds and distribution are governed by the Foundation Board. Volunteer Giving Committee and Regional High School Athletic Training Program Guild members help our staff develop meaningful relationships with our donors.
